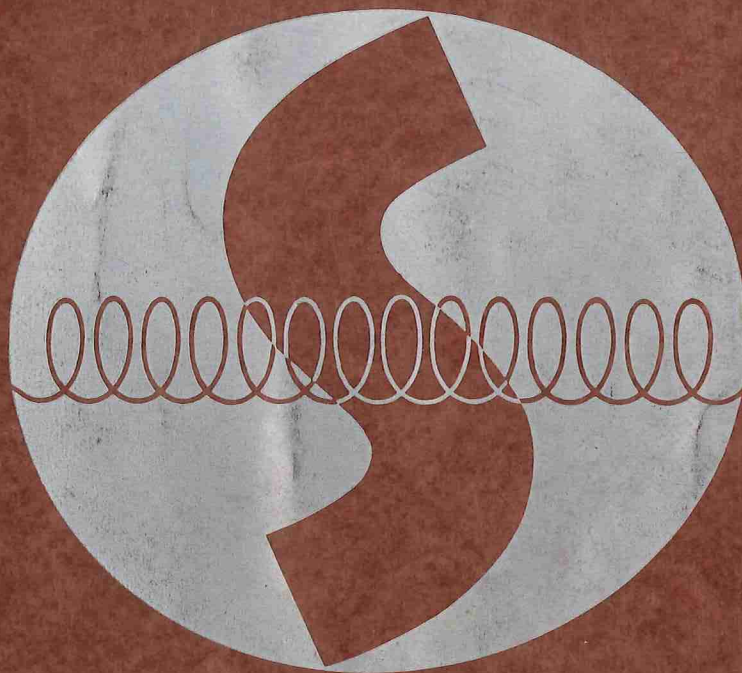

This is a non-profit organization founded in 1942 to serve blind veterans returning from service in World War II. The training is now given without cost to civilian applicants who show promise of achieving economic independence.

William F. Johns, executive director and head trainer for the school, will accompany Mrs. Hamilton, and they will bring with them a blind student and a guide dog for a demonstration. Johns will show a training film and will direct the demonstration

Since the school was founded 662 Guide dogs have been presented to graduates without cost. Of these 119 are veterans, and 19 are women. The enrollment last year was 102, and will be even larger this year. The school plant at San Rafael is entirely free of debt, and covers an 11-acre tract. A staff of 20 people is used to train the students. The organization breeds and raises most of the guide dogs, which are given scientific tests to determine their aptitude.

The meeting next Thursday will be held in the parish hall of the Community Church to give more adequate space. Officers of the Tierra Adorada District, and the president and a representative of each federated club in the District, as well as the Junior Club have been invited to attend. 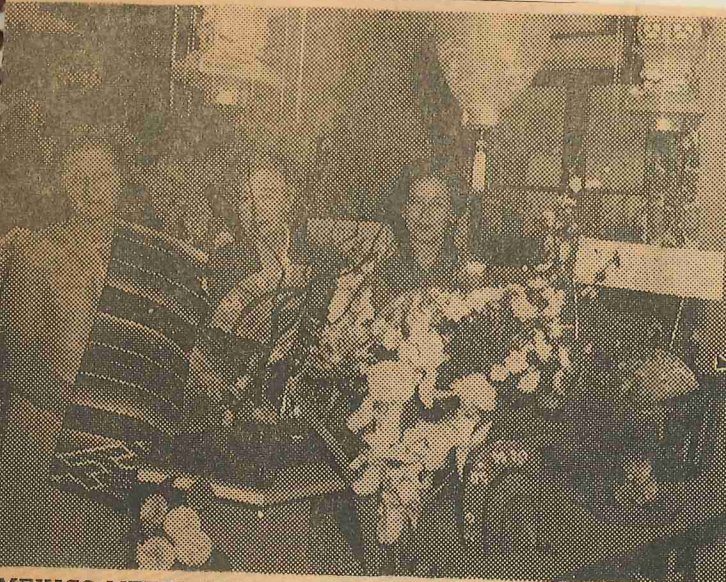

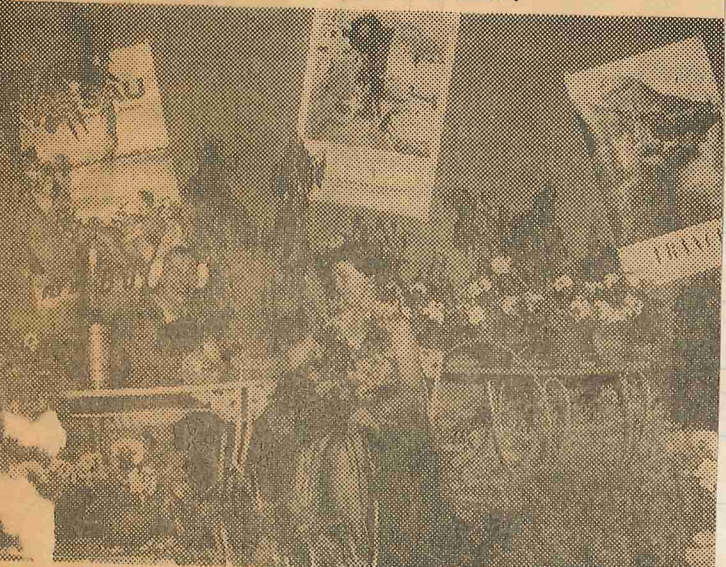
