Reason for choice of project(s): The need of an organization and a building adequate to display and safeguard valuable records and artifacts of this area. The passing of early pioneers and the breaking up of old homesteads and estates has led occasionally to the loss of much worthy material which has been destroyed or given to people or museums outside of our community. There also seems to be a lack of material in our library which deals with early Carpinteria and California history of community cooperation:

Berso Contest chairman and/or president In January 1959, the Carpinteria Chamber of Commerce asked the Carpinteria Womans Club if they would explore the possibility of forming a historical society and establishing a museum for Carpinteria Valley. It was the belief of the Chamber of Commerce officers that the Carpinteria Womans Club had been interested in the Valley history for many years and were the logical ones to undertake this project as a community service.

In recent years there has been a growing interest in the saving of historical material in the Carpinteria Valley and it is evident to many residents that there is a need for an organization with a building adequate to display and safeguard valuable records and artifacts of this aream, which is rich in history of the India n, Mexican, Spanish and pioneer American periods. The passing of early pioneers and the breaking up of old homesteads and estates has led occasionally to the loss of much worthy material which has been destroyed or given to people or museums outside of our community.

The goal of such an organization would be to preserve the history of the Carpinteria Valley from the Ventura County Line to Ortega Hill and to work toward the establishment of a museum and library here.

On February 13, 1959 at a meeting held at the Carpinteria Womans Club house, the Carpinteria Valley Historical Society was formed. At subsequent meetings, by-laws were read and approved, officers elected and in due time the organization was incorporated as a non-profit organization in the State of California. Great help and encouragement in forming the society was given by the Carpinteria Womans Club, Carpinteria Chamber of Commerce, Carpinteria Herald, Security First National Bank (Carpinteria Branch), Carpinteria Lions Club, Tierra de Oro Parlor #304, Native Daughters of the Golden West of Santa Barbara, Summerland Citizens Committee, the Junior Womans Club of Carpinteria, The Carpinteria Auxiliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and the Carpinteria Masonic Lodge.

Two social events have been held during the year, both a great success. The first was a beach picnic held at the beach home of President and Mrs. L.N.Bailard, and the other an old fashioned box soxial held at the Canalino School in Carpinteria.

At the close of the charter membership drive there were 228 members. Although the majority of Charter members are of families who have been living in the valley for several generations, there are also some charter members who are rather new residents here. Five of the charter members are children between the ages of ten and thirteen years and they have shown great interest in the society.

At the first annual meeting of the society on January 25th, 1960,

Mr. L.N.Bailard was re-elected for a second term of office as president. Members gathering for the meeting enjoyed a very interesting exhibit of historical Indian relics, pictures, dolls, musical instruments and miscellaneous articles of early days.

At the present time there is a letter on file with the County Board of Supervisors requesting them to consider the leasing of three county owned lots in Carpinteria for 99 years to the Society in order that they may build a museum.

It is the belief that a historical society and a museum will fill a great need in the valley as there seems to be a lack of material dealing with California history. While it will be necessary to start on a small scale in the building of a museum due to lack of finances, so many things have been offered to the group (wagons, carriages, carts, stage coach, saddles, etc.) that it is believed that eventually it will be necessary to have quite a large museum.

Mrs. William A. Birss was elected temporary chairman, and Mrs. George E. Johnson was chosen temporary secretary.

A by-laws committee was appointed. On the committee are Mrs. Birss, H. W. Hitchcock, Mrs. Johnson, Mrs. Carl W. Kirkwood, Gordon Lord and Clyde Wullbrandt.

On the building and grounds committee will be L. N. Bailard, H. W. Hitchcock, George E. Johnson and Raymond D. Greene.

Bro. Ray Greene was appointed by the W.M. to represent the lodge at a meeting called by the Women's Club to discuss the formation of a local historical society. The meeting was held at the Club house on Fri. night, Feb. 13th. Twenty-

one interested people from Carpinteria and Summerland were present and they voted to organize the Carpinteria Valley Historical Society. Mrs. Elizabeth Birss, temporary chairman, appointed a committee to formulate By-laws and another committee to investigate possible locations for a building. An organization meeting will be held Wednesday night, March 25th, at 7:30 p.m. in the Women's Club House. All Masons are requested to check their possessions for any old time pictures, books or other material pertaining to the Carpinteria Valley which would be helpful in starting an exhibit, and if interested, attend the next meeting.

Historical Unit Hears Reports

The Carpinteria Valley Historical Society which was organized in February met at the Woman's Clubhouse last Wednesday for the purpose of studying proposed by-laws for incorporation as a non-profit institution.

The gathering was addressed briefly by Elbert Conner, member of the board of directors of the Caifornia State Historical Society, and a former president of the Santa Barbara Historical Society. Conner expressed a serious interest in our local group and a desire to help with the development of the Carpinteria Society. He explained that there is an ever-increasing interest in the state in the formation of local historical societies and such groups are encouraged and assisted by the State Historical Society. He feels that the enthusiasm of the local group will insure its success, and result in the establishment of a worthwhile museum here for the preservation of Carpinteria Valley history.

A report from the Building and Grounds Committee was postponed until the next meeting, pending the return of Neil Bailard from Louisiana.

The proposed by-laws were read, corrections and additions made, and they will be presented to a vote of the membership at the April meeting. A motion for incorporation was adopted. As temporary directors for purposes of incorporation the following were selected: Mrs. William Birss, Mrs. George E. Johnson, and Mr. Clyde Wullbrandt. Nomination and election of 5 officers and 2 directors will be conducted at the next meeting.

In recent years there has been a growing interest in the saving of historical material in the Carpinteria Valley and Summerland, and it is evident to many residents that there is a need for an organization with a building adequate to display and safeguard valuable records and artifacts of this area, which is rich in history of the Indian, Mexican, Spanish, and pioneer American periods. The passing of early pioneers and breaking up of old homesteads and estates has led occasionally to the loss of worthy material.

The annual reception given for Carpinteria Valley Pioneers by the Santa Barbara Native Daughters of the Golden West, Tierra de Oro Parlor No. 304, has stirred interest in local history; and on February 13, 1959, with the help of the Carpinteria Womans Club and the encouragement of the Carpinteria Herald and the Carpinteria Valley Chamber of Commerce, a meeting was held at the Womans Clubhouse when the twenty-one people present voted to establish the Carpinteria Valley Historical Society. At a second meeting in March, a motion to incorporate a non-profit organization for historical and educational purposes was unanimously adopted. Two committees were appointed to consider adoption of by-laws and location of a building.

On Wednesday evening, April 29, at 7:30 P.M., we will gather for the election of four officers: President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer; and twelve Directors: three to serve for two years, three for three years, and three to serve for four years.

We extend to you an invitation to become a charter member of the Carpinteria Valley Historical Society, with the hope that you will assist us to preserve our valley's history. Annual dues for Active Membership are \$5.00 per member; and for those who wish to contribute more there are the following types of membership: Sustaining Members, \$10.00; Contributing Members, \$15.00; Patrons, \$25.00; and Benefactors, \$100.00 or more. Membership cards will be issued. Those who have paid annual dues will be qualified to vote. Memberships may be taken for organizations, permitting one vote.

As this is a non-profit corporation, membership fees may be deducted from income taxes. Presentation of valuable articles to the Society may reduce inheritance taxes measurably in some cases.






